TO OUR FIRST CAN:DO GROUP ANNUAL REPORT

This is the 140th Annual Report of Townsend House and the 123rd Annual Report of The Royal South Australian Deaf Society.

Can:Do Group is the umbrella organisation encompassing Can:Do 4Kids, Townsend House Inc and Deaf Can:Do, The Royal South Australian Deaf Society Inc.

Can:Do 4Kids, Townsend House Inc was established in 1874 to serve blind and deaf children. It was then called The Institution for the Blind, the Deaf and Dumb. In 1891, concerned about the moral welfare of young Deaf people who completed their education and left Townsend House, its Superintendent Samuel Johnson initiated establishment of the Deaf and Dumb Mission, today known as Deaf Can:Do, The Royal South Australian Deaf Society Inc.

In 2007 the two organisations came together as the Can:Do Group. The integrated Can:Do Group operates a shared management and infrastructure model supporting South Australia's two oldest charitable service providers.

The Can:Do Group also incorporates businesses whose profits directly contribute to Can:Do 4Kids and Deaf Can:Do services. These include a full service audiology clinic, Can:Do Hearing and our lifestyle villages; Townsend Park at Hove and Townsend of Strathalbyn, Lewis Fields.

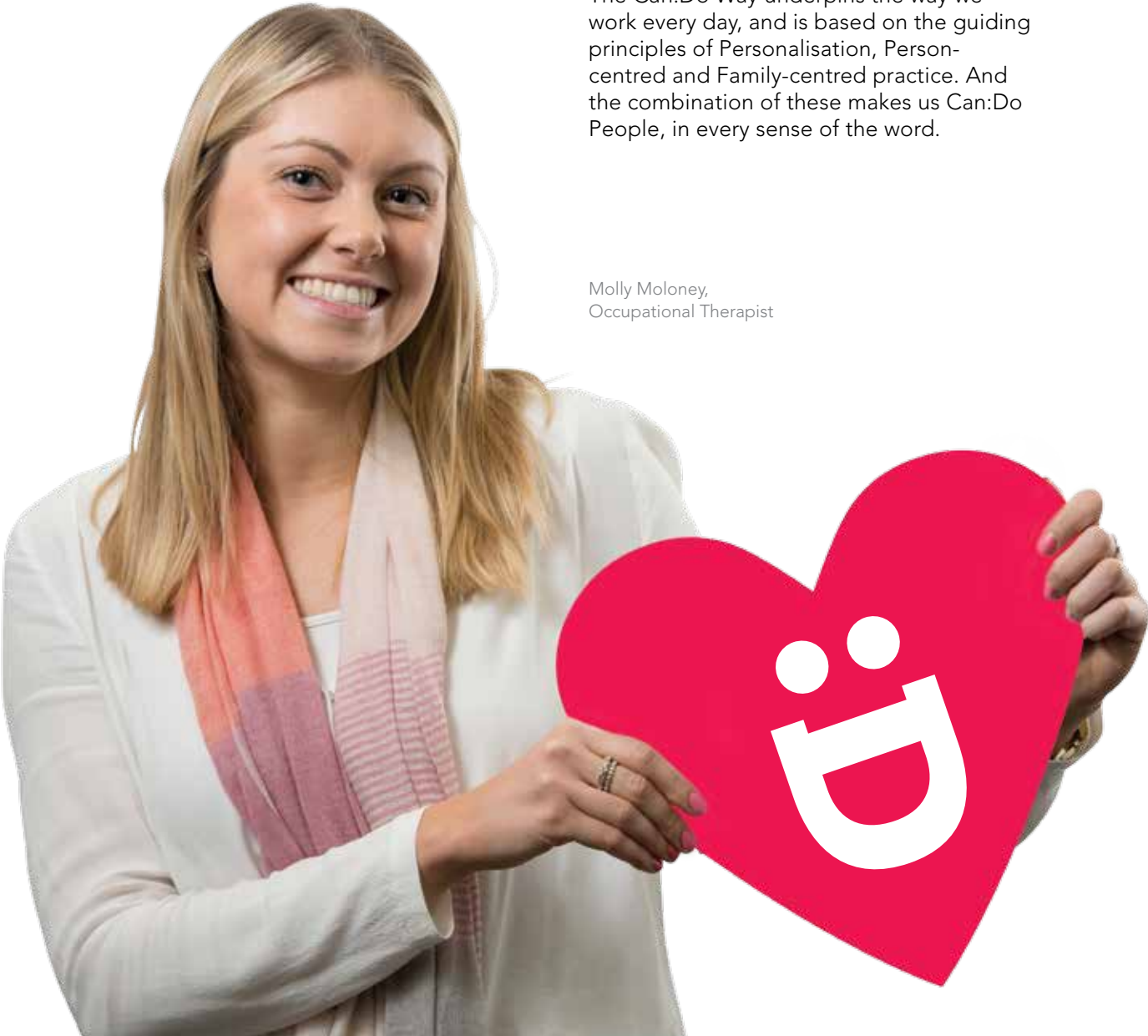

WE CELEBRATED 140 YEARS!

140 years ago William Townsend had a mission to ensure that all young South Australians who were deaf or blind received an education, were suitably housed and cared for, and, most importantly, were accepted within the community. Townsend's important work continues today and in 2014 we celebrate the 140th anniversary of Can:Do 4Kids!



WE CELEBRATED CAROLYN'S PRESTIGIOUS AWARD

We were delighted to congratulate Can:Do 4Kids and Deaf Can:Do Board Member Carolyn Palmer AM - a lifelong advocate for young people with vision impairment - on her award of Member of the Order of Australia for significant services to the community.



WE SUPPORTED THE DEAF COMMUNITY

We supported the Deaf Community into new facilities following the sale of our South Terrace, Adelaide property. The Deaf Community and its sports and social club, Deaf Community and Sports SA (DCSSA), began work to establish our Modbury property as the new cultural home for South Australia's Deaf Community.

Deaf Can:Do Interpreting provided over 10,000 hours of professional Auslan-English interpreting to more than 800 individuals and businesses in addition to community events – such as Candles by Candlelight.



WE WELCOMED THE NDIS

July 2013 saw the launch of the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS). As a major South Australian children's service provider, Can:Do 4Kids is at the forefront of the roll out of the new scheme which will deliver positive outcomes Australia-wide in the coming years.



WE TAUGHT AUSLAN

300 students took part in Talking Hands—our fun introductory Auslan (Australian Sign Language) courses. We also provided Deaf awareness training to organisations across Adelaide.

WE CAN:DO TV!

Eleven committed Can:Do supporters became TV stars! Our partnership with Charity Adventure TV saw these supporters commit to raising \$10,000 each before embarking on a mystery adventure to Tasmania –which was then broadcast on national television. Celebrating 140 Years



Townsend House was founded in 1874 by William Townsend who, after two terms in office as Lord Mayor of Adelaide, set about fulfilling his ambition to establish a "Blind Asylum in the City of Adelaide". Originally founded as the South Australian Institution for the Blind, Deaf and Dumb, the charity opened its doors to five blind and two deaf students, beginning a commitment that continues today as Can:Do 4Kids, Townsend House.



The property continued to grow with the purchase of a further 15 ½ acres of land; the adjoining property north east of Townsend House bordering Wattle and King George. 20 acres of wheat and 3 acres of Lucerne were being cultivated. Large areas were devoted to growing fruit and vegetables, while cows and cattle were also maintained on the property. The farm was operated until 1963.



Townsend House is a two storey stone building built in the Victorian Gothic style; it is 154 feet long and 33 feet 6 inches tall. The building commenced in 1876 and was completed in 1878 for a tendered cost of £4,289.



On 17 December 1999, residential facilities closed at Townsend House. This was due largely to changing community attitudes, fewer registrations and the high cost of running accommodation.



After 1880 enrolments continued to grow creating an even greater need for accommodation at Townsend House. A generous bequest in 1883 made possible an addition to the main building named The Anderson Wing, after J.G. Anderson a commercial traveller who made the bequest.



The official launch of Can:Do 4Kids, Townsend House took place on Friday 7 December 2001. Can:Do 4Kids, Townsend House is South Australia's oldest charity and continues to provide specialised services for children and young adults with a sensory impairment to enhance their quality of life.

Our Year

FROM THE CAN:DO 4KIDS CHAIR, DEAF CAN:DO CHAIR AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE

Welcome to our first Can:Do Group Annual Report. This new combined format reflects our determined integration strategy in which Can:Do 4Kids, Townsend House Inc and Deaf Can:Do, The Royal South Australian Deaf Society Inc align to operate within a group framework. Since the 2007 merger, shared Board Governance, management and corporate services structure has provided a strong foundation of knowledge and skills that has increased service and pathway opportunities for clients and created operating efficiencies. Our commitment to continuous improvement is evident in ongoing projects aimed at further streamlining corporate, clinical and governance operating systems and work practices.

During this year we have continued to align and integrate activities that have enabled capacity growth to deliver expanded services across the Group. As we strive to support children and adults with sensory impairment to be best they can, children with hearing loss are able to move seamlessly from diagnosis by Can:Do Hearing to support by Can:Do 4Kids therapists, all in a familiar and family

friendly environment. Our purpose built Welland clinics are abuzz with activity and laughter as children are assessed and supported to learn. Colourful murals and interactive games have turned the group therapy room into a fun learning and development environment for children. Fun and a relaxed though professional clinical setting for adult clients and staff is what sets us apart - our Can:Do attitude and the Can:Do Way guides us in all we do. We make it easy for everyone to do business with us.

Now into year 2 of a 3 year trial of NDIS for children 0-14years with any disability in South Australia, we have worked side by side with the National Disability Insurance Agency to fine tune policy and practices that will become embedded when NDIS reaches full national roll out in 2018. We want to especially thank our Children's Client Services team for their dedication to assisting families navigate the maze of planning meetings, helping to reduce the complexity and making it easy for everyone.

2014 is a very special year for Can:Do 4Kids as we celebrate 140 years continuous service to children with sensory impairment. When William Townsend decided to do something about the plight of a group of deaf, hearing impaired and blind, vision impaired children living in appalling conditions at the Parkside Lunatic asylum in 1873, he laid the foundations of a first class service, building on values of caring, courage, connectedness and conscientiousness that live on today in our Can:Do Attitude. And when Samuel Johnson, Townsend House Superintendent moved to establish the Deaf and Dumb Mission in 1891, which we now call Deaf Can:Do, he shared those same values. As Chairs and Group Chief Executive of Can:Do 4Kids, Townsend House and Deaf Can:Do, The Royal South Australian Deaf Society, we are privileged to continue their legacy.

The services we deliver today are much like those of the early days though the environment and way we operate is quite different with the majority delivered in schools, homes and clinics rather than institutional settings. In February 2014, after a long and exhaustive battle to find a viable way we could retain our Deaf Society property at South Terrace Adelaide, which had been the cultural home of South Australia's Deaf community since 1927, we were ultimately forced to make the difficult financial decision to sell it. The Deaf Community and its sports and social club, Deaf Community and Sports SA, have relocated to our Famechon Crescent, Modbury property in an arrangement that guarantees their security and tenure for at least the next half century. Financial support from the whole Can:Do Group has enabled DCSSA and the Community to establish sporting and social facilities that will preserve Deaf culture into the future. At the same time we have undertaken to support and encourage the Community's young people and emerging leaders' personal and professional growth and development through scholarships and training.

To guarantee exceptional services into the future, we have continued our investment in staff training and development. This year 18 operational leaders and senior technical staff have completed Bringing Out the Best, our tailored personal and professional development program that builds on their technical knowledge and personal values to equip them to lead their teams into the future. Technical skills development programs in specific disciplines such as Auslan Interpreting, speech and occupational therapy and assistive technology have continued throughout the year.

After 7 years as our Patron and good friend, Rear Admiral Kevin Scarce AC CSC RANR ended his term as Governor of South Australia in August 2014. Kev as he prefers to be known, and wife Liz have been familiar and very welcome faces at Can:Do 4Kids and Deaf Can:Do, supporting very many of our events and celebrations, often playing with the youngest of our

child clients, cooking the BBQ and joining in a joke with staff and families. We will miss them in their official capacity and are delighted that they are keen to remain in the Can:Do family. At the same time we warmly welcome the Hon Hieu Van Le, AO South Australia's new Governor who has generously agreed to be Patron of both Can:Do 4Kids and Deaf Can:Do; we look forward to sharing many happy occasions with him and Mrs Le.

2013-14 has been another challenging and exciting year for everyone and we especially thank our committed staff across the Group for their loyalty and hard work. Thanks too to the Directors of both Boards, all of whom are volunteers, for their selfless generosity of time and skills that enable us to drive this amazingly diverse Group into the future. Of special note was the retirement of Kevin Jolly as Director Can:Do 4Kids and Deaf Can:Do Chair for more than 20 years. Kevin and his wife Maree have been vocal advocates for the Deaf Community for many years more than Kevin's Board tenure and he often reflects on his Deaf parents' challenges and perseverance to build careers and strong community connections. Kevin and Maree will always share a special place in Can:Do Group history and we wish them the best in their retirement.

Finally we acknowledge and sincerely thank our many business partners, sponsors, donors, supporters and friends without whom we could not continue to deliver outstanding services to people who need us. In an environment of heightened child and consumer protection, escalating compliance and regulatory imposts along with salary and wage adjustments and operating cost increases, we are continually challenged by the ever widening gap between funding and service income and the cost of doing business. Financial and in-kind support of our vast number of partners, sponsors, donors and friends assists in closing that gap.

We sincerely trust you enjoy this new format and thank you again for your support.

OUR VOLUNTEERS

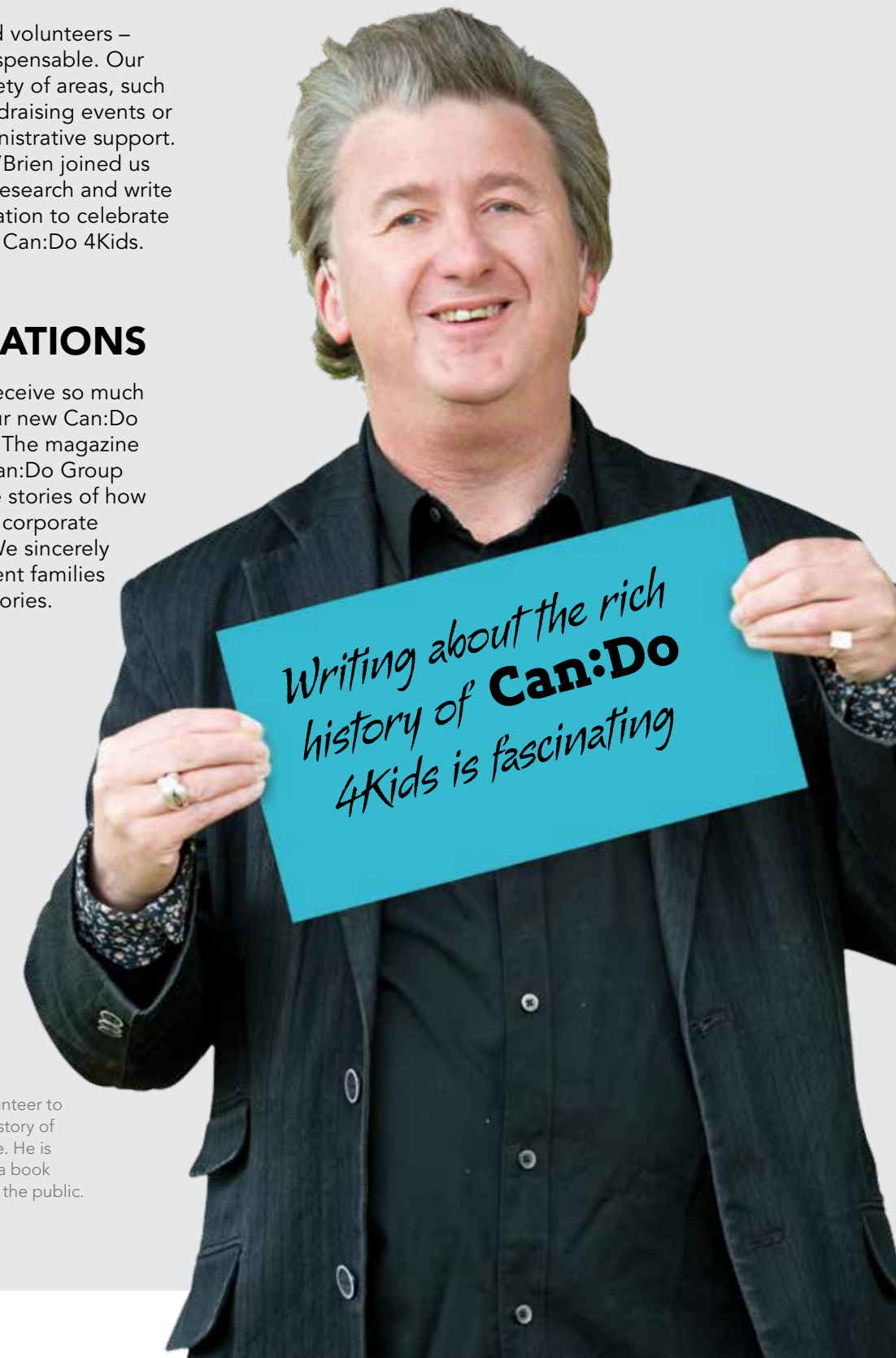

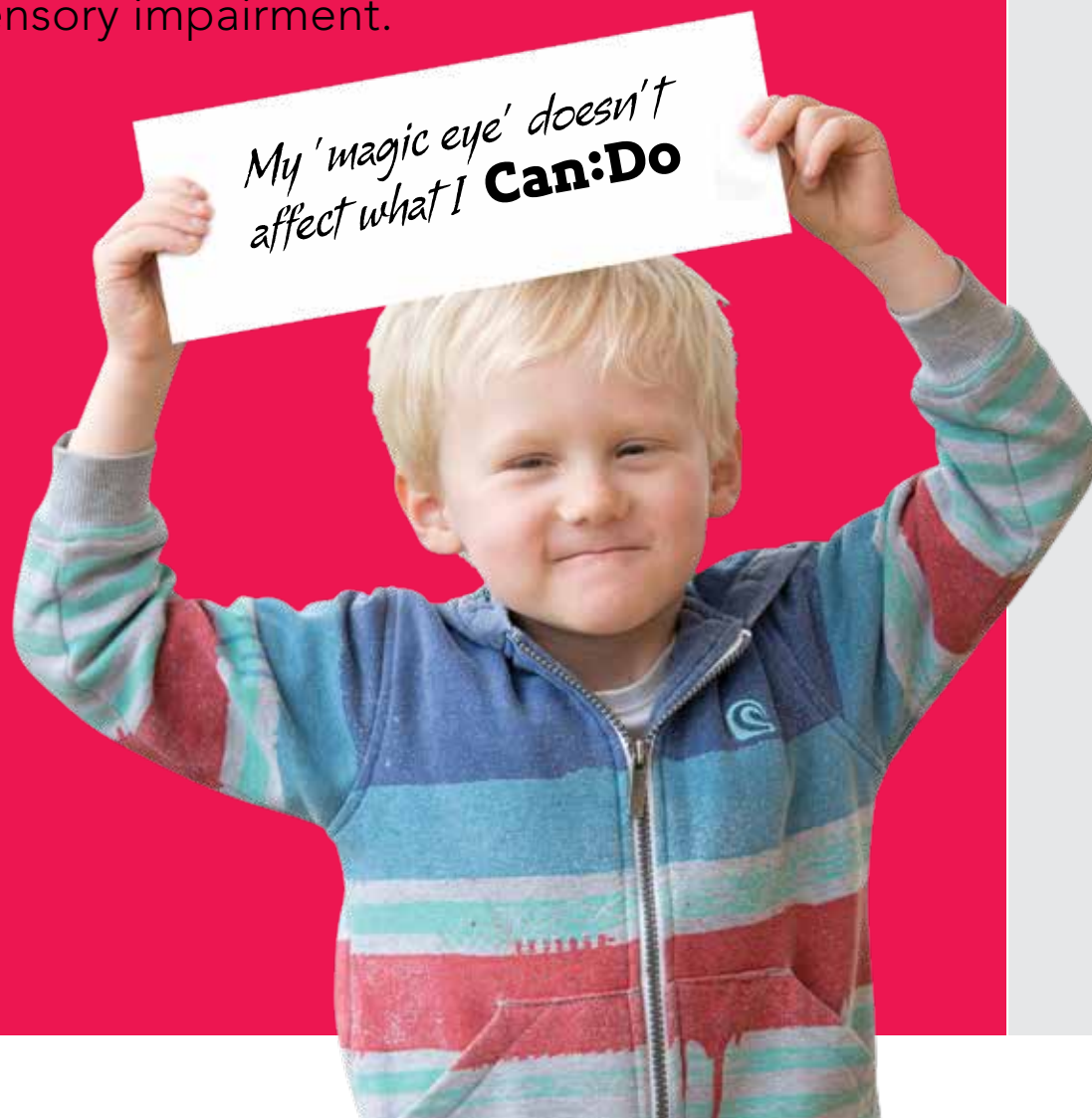
David joined our team as a volunteer to research and write about the history of Can:Do 4Kids, Townsend House. He is looking forward to completing a book which will be made available to the public.

Can:Do 4Kids, Townsend House Inc is South Australia's oldest charitable service provider, offering vital therapy and support to children and young people who are blind, deaf or sensory impaired and their families. Townsend House has provided family-centred support for over 140 years.

Established in 1874 by William Townsend as The Institution for the Blind, the Deaf and Dumb, Townsend House served as accommodation and a school for deaf and blind children. Townsend, who arrived in Australia from the UK in 1853, became South Australia's first philanthropist and a champion for people with sensory impairment.

Brayden has vision impairment. The technical terms are coloboma, meaning a hole in part of the structures of the eye, and microphthalmia, literally meaning 'small eyes'. He was fitted with an ocular prosthesis (an artificial eye), which he calls his 'magic eye', when he was nearly four. Our team support Brayden with Occupational Therapy in both group and individual sessions.

It is estimated that up to 10,000 South Australian kids face every day with a vision, hearing or sensory impairment



OUR YEAR

National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS)

2013-14 is the first year of a three year trial in which we are one of the largest registered NDIS providers. We are working closely with families to understand the NDIS and provide support as they transition to the new funding model. As a major South Australian children's service provider, we are at the forefront of the rollout of the new scheme which will deliver positive outcomes Australia-wide in coming years.

We now support families with NDIS plans with early intervention, occupational therapy, speech pathology, assistive technology, social and life skills, Auslan, physiotherapy, psychology and counselling, audiology and family support. Our team also answer questions, assist families with planning and attend meetings to maximise opportunities.

Our Team

We were so proud of Kim Martin, Manager Client Services when she was awarded 2014 Educator of the Year at the Australian Computers in Education Conference in Adelaide. Kim also became a Google Certified Teacher – a prestigious title only held by 1,500 people worldwide. This accreditation will allow Kim to advise families on using technology to support their child's learning and development.

Professional development remains an important priority for our team. We participated in the Asia Pacific Autism Conference. Can:Do 4Kids staff members Kim Martin and Tristan Fergusson were honoured to be asked to present a poster on Assistive Technology at the International Vision 2014 Conference.

What an amazing outcome for four members of staff who took part in the Can:Do Caper 'Amazing Race' style event and fundraising in their exciting two day adventure.

Our Centre at Welland

Our families are enjoying the new facilities at our Welland centre, which features a well-equipped training room, children's activity room, family area and playground. We thank Allan from Cops 4 Kids who kindly volunteered to decorate our activity room. The multi-sensory farmyard theme looks fantastic and our young clients have all enjoyed feeling the animals' various textures. Originally established as institutional accommodation, welfare support and a school for deaf and blind children in 1874 by William Townsend, Can:Do 4Kids now offers specialist sensory services in a variety of settings. We're proud to say we've made a real and lasting positive change in the lives of thousands of young South Australians and their families for more than 140 years.

We work with our clients and their families to set goals and tailor a combination of therapies to best achieve these goals.

Whilst hearing or vision impairment is the primary condition of many of our clients, we increasingly support children with additional needs such as Fragile X Syndrome, Down Syndrome, Cerebral Palsy, Developmental and Communication Delays or Autism Spectrum Disorders.

As South Australia's only specialist service provider in vision and hearing, our expert knowledge proves invaluable in assisting children every year to reach their full potential.

Services are delivered at our Welland clinic (59-61 Grange Road, Welland), clients' homes, educational settings and community centres in metropolitan Adelaide in addition to rural and remote regions of South Australia.

Early Intervention

Our experienced Early Intervention team works alongside families to help them support their child's learning through setting foundations for future growth and development. We offer programs to children up to six years old.

Services are tailored and include education regarding diagnosis and therapies; setting and working towards developmental goals; assistance with specialist medical appointments and transition to childcare, preschool and school. Our Early Intervention individual and group sessions are a fun and effective way for our clients to reach their potential.

Axel has a vision and hearing impairment and takes part in our Early Intervention groups.



Speech Therapy

We specialise in supporting children and young people with a range of needs to develop vital communication, literacy and language skills. We work with children and their families to provide individualised support - using a range of approaches to maximise communication goals. Approaches may include Auditory Oral, Auslan (Australian Sign Language) and Picture Exchange Communication System (PECS) to support children's communication development. Services also extend to general speech therapy such as Auditory Processing Disorder (APD). We're very proud to have one of the only Speech Pathologists in South Australia in our team who can offer Auslan in Speech Therapy sessions.

Charli has a hearing impairment and global development delay. Our therapists visit Charli each week at school to deliver Speech and Occupational Therapy.



Spencer has Autism Spectrum Disorder and Leber's Congenital Amaurosis – a type of vision impairment. Spencer attends group Occupational Therapy sessions and also receives individual support to target his developmental needs.



Our Assistive Technology Officer Tristan supports Will – who has a vision impairment – to learn and develop skills using specialist technology.

Occupational Therapy

Our Occupational Therapists support children and young people develop fine and gross motor skills, cognitive skills and independent living skills in order to be successful in their daily lives. Support is delivered both individually and in groups, key skill areas of development including prebraille, self-advocacy and school readiness.

We support children with sensory processing difficulties, sleep issues and toilet training. Our Occupational Therapists also offer aquatic therapy.

Pathways

Our Pathways program supports children and young people from six to 18 to develop social and life skills, connect with their community and maximise learning opportunities. Pathways events serve as a link to develop peer and community networks and offer the opportunity to try community-based activities in a safe environment. Other services include Auslan (Australian Sign Language) skill development and support for transition to primary and high school and post-school adult services.

Assistive Technology

Our experienced Assistive Technology team, in partnership with clients, families and schools, develop tailored support that explores equipment and technology options. Access to the right technology can make a real difference to children and young people, helping to increase opportunities to learn, whilst developing self-reliance and independence. Services may include technology assessments and recommendations, equipment trials, and training sessions for clients and families, teachers and support staff.

Multidisciplinary Approach

Can:Do 4Kids services have expanded over the past year and we now offer physiotherapy, psychology, and counselling as part of a multidisciplinary approach to support children and their families.

Paediatric Audiology

We offer extensive paediatric audiology services from our state of the art facilities, including hearing tests for all children from six months of age and Auditory Processing Disorder Assessments for children over the age of six. All paediatric appointments are conducted by a senior paediatric audiologist who has had extensive experience assessing children of all ages.

Deaf Can:Do, The Royal South Australian Deaf Society, delivers vital services and support to Deaf and Hard of Hearing South Australians. Established in 1891, Deaf Can:Do is South Australia's second oldest registered charitable service provider.

OUR YEAR

It has been a difficult year for the Deaf Community after the sad but necessary decision was made to sell our property at 262 South Terrace - the cultural home of the Deaf Community. We are pleased to see the Deaf Community establishing their new home, 'Modbury Deaf Club' and continue to offer space at our Welland centre for groups to meet.

Our Community Services team continue to provide support to some of the most marginalised members of our community. Our drop-in session program at Welland was expanded last year and continues to prove popular.

In 2013-14 we provided over 10,000 hours of Auslan / English Interpreting in all kinds of settings across the state - from University lectures and corporate meetings to medical appointments and community events, such as Carols by Candlelight.

Six of our staff members completed Certificate IV Training and Assessment, and the team also benefitted from professional development opportunities at the 2nd International Conference of the World Federation of the Deaf.

Our experienced Auslan teachers continue to run our ever-popular Talking Hands classes in addition to specialist Deaf awareness and Deaf culture education in workplaces across the State. This year we ran a full day Auslan workshop in addition to several very popular evenings focussing on a certain group of signs - all the rude words people are always eager to learn!

We receive many questions from the public about Auslan and enjoy providing opportunities for people to learn more about this fascinating language. We were very excited when Peter Goers initiated an interview with our Interpreting Service Support Officer Kelly Ferguson on ABC 891 Adelaide - Peter Goers' first ever live radio interview with a Deaf person.

Maria is a Case Worker at Deaf Can:Do. She provides support, counselling and assistance to members of the Deaf community.



WHAT WE DO

Community Services

Deaf Can:Do provides vital welfare and crisis support to people facing isolation and marginalisation. Our work aims to equip people who are Deaf and Hard of Hearing with the assistance, knowledge and confidence to live independently and contribute to the community.

Our Case Workers provide crisis support, information and advice to more than 200 South Australians facing isolation and marginalisation.

We support clients with day to day challenges, provide support for medical and legal situations, help overcome communication challenges and assist with seeking, securing and sustaining employment. We enable our clients to live independently and contribute meaningfully to their communities.

Auslan Education

Every year we introduce around 300 students to Auslan through our fun and interactive Talking Hands classes. We also offer Deaf awareness and Deaf culture education to organisations across the state. In addition to these classes, we run regular social events, an annual Auslan workshop and one-off classes specialising in particular topics. We also deliver Auslan and Deaf awareness training to organisations at which Deaf people are employed.

Interpreting

Deaf Can:Do provides over 10,000 hours of professional interpreting annually to over 800 individuals and businesses. Auslan/English and Deaf interpreters support Deaf people to effectively communicate in workplaces, at conferences, functions, sporting activities, training and higher education, medical appointments, police and court matters - plus life's important occasions such as weddings and funerals.

We have a large pool of qualified interpreters, all of whom are accredited by NAATI. Our interpreters have extensive local knowledge and play an active part in the South Australian Deaf Community.

Auslan/English interpreting is a specialised skill that requires professional training and experience. We actively support professional development for our interpreting team.

We're proud to be the preferred Auslan/English interpreting service partner for many South Australian organisations.

We're the only South Australian specialist provider of Auslan/English Interpreters and the state's only interpreting service provider whose profits are invested into services for the Deaf Community.

Support for Deaf Culture

Since 1891 Deaf Can:Do, The Royal South Australian Deaf Society has supported the Deaf Community by providing a cultural home in which Deaf people can gather, socialise, enjoy recreational and sporting activities and worship. We focus on encouraging young Deaf people and emerging leaders, offering personal and professional development, scholarship and sponsorship opportunities.

Through the combined resources of Can:Do Group, the Deaf Community has been able to establish a new cultural home along with sports and recreational activities at Modbury.

Can:Do Hearing

Can:Do Hearing is an independent, not-for-profit audiology clinic, with proceeds supporting our charities, Can:Do 4Kids and Deaf Can:Do.

As an independent clinic, Can:Do Hearing is not aligned with any hearing-aid manufacturer and offers Adelaide's largest range of hearing aids and assistive listening devices. We pride ourselves on delivering ethical audiology and believe hearing aids are not the only answer to hearing difficulties.

We deliver services at seven locations across metropolitan Adelaide and pride ourselves on the specialist expertise and up-to-date knowledge of our qualified and

experienced professional Audiologists. Our General Manager Heidi Limareff can be heard on a regular basis talking to Sonya Feldhoff on Adelaide ABC 891 about all things related to hearing health.

Services are available from our clinics at Adelaide (new clinic opened January 2014 at 327 South Terrace), Blackwood, Brighton, Kensington Park (in partnership with Adelaide Paediatrics), Port Adelaide, Old Reynella and Welland.

Paediatric Audiology

For parents looking for peace of mind in a short time frame, Can:Do Hearing provides hearing tests for children from the age of six months on a fee for service basis. The waiting time for an appointment with one of our paediatric audiologists is minimal.

While a referral is not necessary, it is often helpful for us to see the bigger picture. Appointments made for a child with a referral from an Ear, Nose and Throat (ENT) surgeon, neurologist or psychiatrist will be eligible for a Medicare rebate. Hearing Assessments take approximately 45 minutes and are painless – and more importantly, fun!

All paediatric appointments are conducted by a paediatric audiologist who has had extensive experience assessing children of all ages. Audiologists have a University Master's Degree in Audiology and are professional members of Audiology Australia.

Our clinics were designed with children in mind, from the waiting area through to the state-of-the-art testing rooms. Our audiologists have an excellent understanding of how hearing fits into the big picture of your child's development.

Can:Do Hearing staff have excellent professional relationships with the local hospitals, education department and other specialists including ENT's surgeons, paediatricians, speech pathologists, occupational therapists, paediatric psychologists and teachers

Auditory Processing Disorder (APD) Assessment

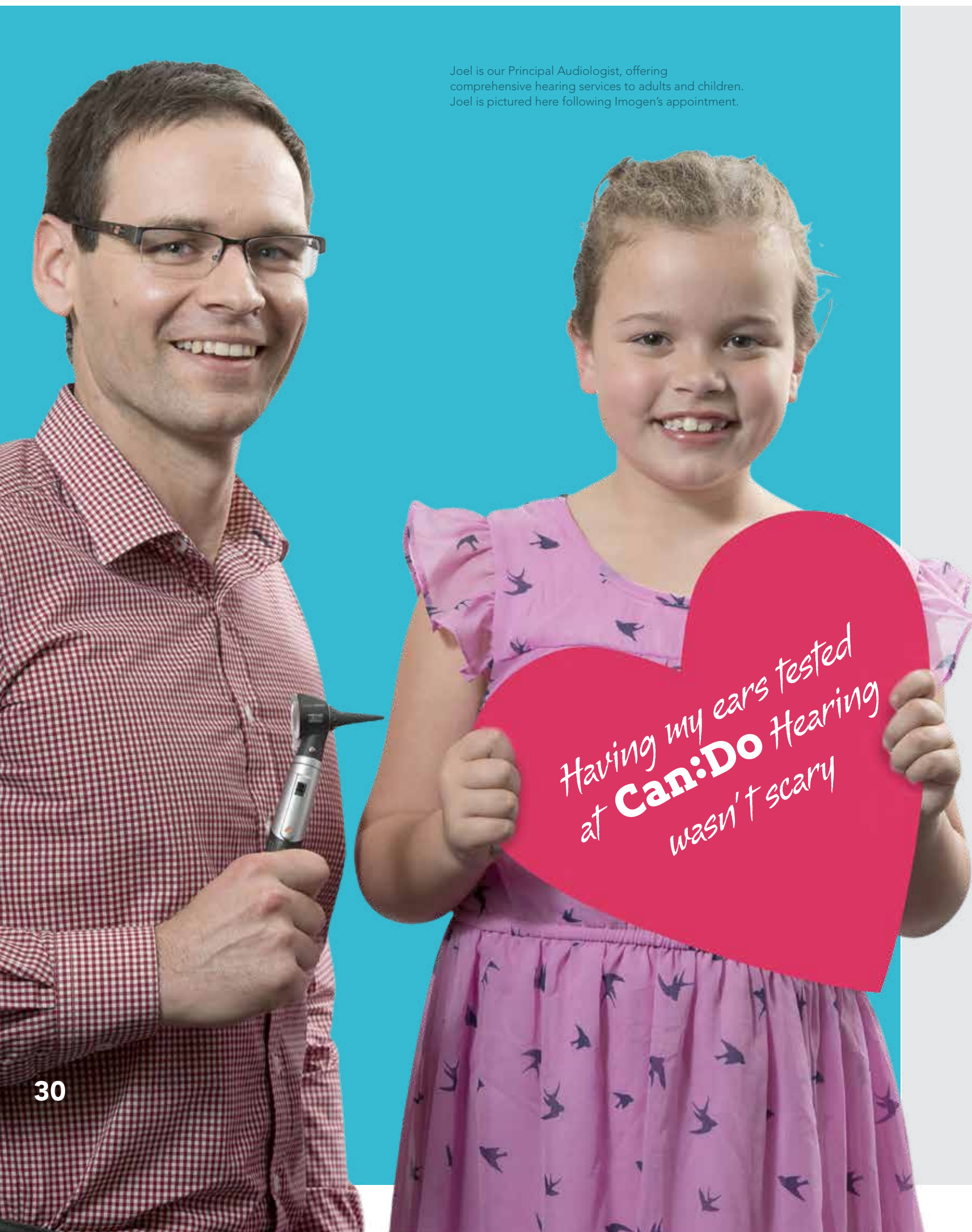
Auditory processing refers to how we use our hearing to detect, decode and process auditory information. An Auditory Processing Disorder (APD) refers to an inability to make optimal use of what we hear. Can:Do Hearing now offers APD assessments that are conducted over two appointments for children aged six and over.

Julianne is one of our Paediatric Audiologists, offering full children's hearing health services including Auditory Processing Disorder assessments for children over six years old.

Children with auditory processing difficulties may display a range of behaviours suggesting they may benefit from an APD assessment. These include, but are not limited to, difficulty concentrating and understanding information in background noise, often requiring information to be repeated or clarified, difficulty remembering and following instructions and difficulty learning to read and spell.

If the child is found to have an APD, they may be referred to Can:Do 4Kids for APD Therapy. This program is individually designed to address each child's specific needs. Can:Do Hearing will also refer to other allied health professionals for opinion and/or management as required.

Adult Audiology

Can:Do Hearing offers full audiology services including free hearing tests to adults age 26 and over.

We offer an extensive range of hearing aids featuring a variety of manufacturers, styles, technology levels, prices and accessories. Our audiologists regularly undergo manufacturer training allowing us to fit the latest products on the market at all times.

In addition, we carry a large range of Assistive Listening Devices to help manage day to day activities limited by hearing loss such as watching television, using the telephone and alerting devices such as loud doorbells and vibrating alarm clocks.

Our team are fully qualified to carry out compensation hearing assessments fit a range of hearing aids provided through worker's compensation.

We also offer aural rehabilitation for people who are hard of hearing to improve hearing and listening skills and develop effective communication strategies. These appointments are free of charge and are currently provided by Dr Christopher Lind of Flinders University who is internationally renowned for his work in this field.

Can:Do Hearing is accredited to provide free services to eligible pensioners and veterans under the Office of Hearing Services voucher scheme.
